Teaching or Indoctrination? Why Most Religious Education Misses the Point. Too many people today are being trained to repeat what they've been told, **instead of being taught to open the Bible** and **discover truth for themselves**. That's a **serious problem**. God didn't give us His Word so we could outsource our thinking to some religious system. He gave us His Word so we could **read it, believe it, and live by it**, personally.

If a teacher truly cares about his students, he won't just hand them a creed or a church manual and say, "Here, believe this." He'll put a Bible in their hands and say, "Search the Scriptures." That's exactly what the Bereans did in Acts 17:11. They didn't just take Paul's word for it, even though he was an apostle. They "searched the scriptures daily, whether those things were so." That's the mindset every believer should have, test everything by the Word of God, not by someone's authority or tradition.

When people are taught to rely on human opinion instead of Scripture, **they end up enslaved to a system, not submitted to God**. They become parrots of a doctrine rather than disciples of Christ. The Bible warns about this. Jesus rebuked the religious leaders of His day because they "taught for doctrines the commandments of men" (Mark 7:7). Paul said plainly, "Let God be true, but every man a liar" (Romans 3:4). That means if someone's teaching doesn't line up with the Bible, **we throw it out**, no matter how respected they are.

We need to criticize religious education that doesn't teach people to think for themselves **with Scripture**, but instead turns them into mindless followers of tradition or a specific creed.

Real faith isn't built on blind obedience to man. It's built on the truth of God's Word. God never tells us to follow a man. He tells us to follow Christ (John 10:27). And you can't follow Jesus if you don't know what He said. That's why every believer needs to study the Bible for themselves. Not with the goal of winning arguments or becoming a theologian, but with the goal of knowing God and walking in His truth.

Let's stop raising up people who just inherit religion and start equipping people who actually believe the Bible because they've read it, wrestled with it, and submitted to it. That's what discipleship looks like.

Not indoctrination, but only what comes from the Word of God. **Break Free** from the System, Study the Word.

Beware a lot of seminaries today teach things that go against the Bible. Some say the Bible has errors or is outdated, but God says all of it is true (2 Timothy 3:16). Some say you need to do good works, be baptized, or follow church rules to be saved, but the Bible says we're saved by grace through faith, not by works (Ephesians 2:8, 9). Others say repentance just means changing your mind, not turning from sin, but the Bible says real repentance means turning to God (Acts 3:19). Some even say Jesus didn't really rise from the dead, even though the Bible says our faith is useless if He didn't (1 Corinthians 15:17). They also try to erase hell or say it's not forever, but Jesus said it is (Matthew 25:41). Many teach that Genesis isn't real history, but Jesus believed it was (Matthew 19:4). Some twist the Bible to match what culture wants instead of sticking to what God said (Isaiah 40:8). Others say everyone is God's child, but only those who trust Jesus are (John 1:12). They act like Jesus never talked about sin or judgment, but He warned people constantly. Worst of all, they say doctrine doesn't matter, but the Bible says it does (1 Timothy 4:16). This kind of teaching doesn't help people, it confuses them and keeps them lost.





I believe it's worth noting that the apostle's instruction was never, "just search the Scriptures and see what you find." But rather, the people searched the Scriptures to ensure that the apostle's teaching aligns.

Teachers and shepherds are a gift from God. Their teaching is to be received with gladness if it aligns with Scripture. As wise teacher doesn't just hand the student a Bible and then ask them to formulate beliefs from it.

You're misunderstanding what I actually wrote. I never said teachers and shepherds aren't needed or that God doesn't use them. What I said—and what Acts 17:11 clearly shows—is that all teaching must be tested by Scripture. The Bereans didn't blindly follow Paul, and he was an apostle. They received the word with eagerness, yes, but they also searched the Scriptures daily to see whether those things were so. That's the model.

No, a wise teacher doesn't just hand someone a Bible and walk away, but he also doesn't ask them to accept a system, creed, or tradition without question. The problem today is that too many teachers expect loyalty to a theological framework instead of loyalty to God's Word. That's what I'm warning against—not godly instruction, but indoctrination.

Ephesians 4:11–14 says God gave teachers to equip the saints and help them grow in maturity so they won't be "tossed to and fro" by false doctrine. But that assumes the teachers are rightly dividing the Word of truth (2 Timothy 2:15), and it also assumes the hearers are comparing what they're taught with Scripture like the Bereans did. That's not rebellion against godly teachers, that's obedience to God's standard.

You're twisting my words if you think I said "just go find your own truth." That's what the world says, not me. What I said is this: don't trust man above Scripture. And that's exactly what Jesus taught when He rebuked the Pharisees for "teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Mark 7:7). If a teacher is faithful to God's Word, praise God. But if not, no amount of title, tradition, or authority makes their teaching valid.

So yes, thank God for true teachers. But even they are accountable to the Word. And every believer still needs to read and study the Bible for themselves so they're not misled. That's not arrogance, that's obedience.

What you just said proves my point. You're defending a system where ministry is elevated alongside, or even above, Scripture. That's exactly the danger I was addressing. You're reading things into my post that I didn't say. I never denied that God gives teachers. I never said every believer becomes a teacher. I never set the Word against ministry. What I said, and what the Bible says, is that all teaching must be tested by the Word of God, and that every believer is called to know that Word for themselves.

You brought up 1 Corinthians 12, which talks about spiritual gifts in the body of Christ. But that chapter doesn't say teachers are the final authority. It says God has placed different members in the body to serve different roles. Yes, there are teachers (1 Corinthians 12:28), but that same Bible **commands** believers to test all things (1 Thessalonians 5:21), to study to show themselves approved (2 Timothy 2:15), and to be like the Bereans, who didn't blindly follow even an apostle without checking the Scriptures (Acts 17:11). That isn't rebellion, that's discernment.

You also mentioned "tradition," but Jesus warned sharply against elevating tradition over Scripture. He said, "Full well ye reject the commandment of God, that ye may keep your own tradition" (Mark 7:9). Paul told the Colossians, "Beware lest any man spoil you through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, and not after Christ" (Colossians 2:8). Not all tradition is bad, but if it ever competes with or overrides Scripture, it must be rejected.

God did not give us His Word so that we could depend on someone else to explain it to us **for life**. He gave us His Spirit to guide us into all truth (John 16:13), and His Word to sanctify us (John 17:17). Teachers are a blessing, **if they submit to Scripture**. But if someone says, 'Let me tell you what this means, just trust me,' and **discourages people from studying the Bible themselves**, they are not helping the body, they are enslaving it, **and possibly leading others into deception**.

There's no conflict between the Word and godly ministry. **The conflict is between the Word and man-made systems that claim to speak for God but contradict what He actually said**. If you're depending on the body without depending on the Head, you're in danger. And Christ is the Head, **not the clergy**, **not the church system**, **and not tradition** (Colossians 1:18).

So yes, we all have different gifts. But **God's Word is for all, not just for teachers**. "All Scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Timothy 3:16–17). **That applies to every believer, not just the pulpit**. If you think otherwise, maybe it's time you broke free from the system that trained you to depend on men more than on Scripture.

I hear your experience, but respectfully, you're mixing up two different issues. No one is saying believers should lean on their own understanding apart from God. What I said is that we must lean on God's Word, not on man's authority. That includes pastors, teachers, church systems, and yes, even ourselves. Proverbs 3:5 says, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart, and lean not unto thine own understanding," but it doesn't say, "So just trust men who claim they have more light than you."

The real problem wasn't that you were studying the Bible on your own. The problem was that you ended up in a false system, Word of Faith, because no one taught you how to rightly divide the Word of truth (2 Timothy 2:15). That's not a failure of Scripture; that's a failure of discernment. The solution isn't to hand the steering wheel over to men who say they have a deeper revelation. It's to submit everything, including their teaching, to the full counsel of God's Word.

You say yes to indoctrination. But Jesus rebuked the Pharisees because they were indoctrinating people with the traditions of men, not the truth of God. He said, "In vain they do worship me, teaching for doctrines the commandments of men" (Matthew 15:9). Paul warned the Colossians to beware of being spoiled "through philosophy and vain deceit, after the tradition of men, after the rudiments of the world, and not after Christ" (Colossians 2:8).

We all start out needing instruction. No question there. But we're not called to be spoon-fed for life. Hebrews 5:12 rebukes believers who "ought to be teachers" but still needed milk. God expects us to grow, and that growth happens through the Word, not just through someone else's opinions. Teachers are a gift, but only when they point people to Scripture, not when they ask for blind loyalty or act like gatekeepers of truth.

The Holy Spirit does guide believers into truth (John 16:13), and He uses His Word to do it (John 17:17). If some things take time to understand, fine, we

keep studying. But saying that only select men have "more light than the average saint" opens the door to spiritual elitism and error. God gave us the Bible for a reason, and He expects every believer to read it, study it, and test everything against it (Acts 17:11, 1 Thessalonians 5:21). That's not pride, that's obedience.

If you don't study the Bible for yourself, you're wide open to deception, and you just might end up in a Word of Faith church or some other cult without even realizing it. If someone tells you not to study the Bible for yourself, watch out. That's how deception starts.

You're accusing me of twisting your words, yet your entire argument rests on a false accusation I never made. I never said believers have to "teach themselves" or that we should reject those who labor in the Word. What I said, and what the Bible teaches, is that every believer is called to test all things by Scripture, not blindly accept what any teacher or leader says (1 Thessalonians 5:21). That's not rebellion, that's obedience to God's Word. You quoted 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13 to say leaders are "over" others, and they are, in a biblical sense of service and example, but **Paul didn't say "obey them** without question." You're adding that. Verse 21 still stands as a command to all the brethren, not just the leaders: "Prove all things." Your interpretation conveniently cuts that off to preserve your system of control, not the text. People like you, who resist being held accountable to what the Bible actually teaches, are exactly the kind of people I'm warning others to watch out for. Why are you so opposed to people reading and studying the Bible for themselves? If you were truly teaching the truth of God's Word, you wouldn't be threatened by that.

You claim that 1 Timothy 4:16 proves that believers were meant to depend on Timothy's teaching. **No**, it proves Timothy needed to stay faithful to doctrine, so those hearing him would be saved. **That verse says nothing about forbidding others from testing what they heard.** Paul told Timothy to "command and teach," yes, **but what he was teaching was sound doctrine**, doctrine that must be examined in light of Scripture. The entire point of Paul's letters is **to preserve truth**, **not protect authority**.

You also claim that believers shouldn't "teach themselves" or examine what apostles said, yet in Acts 17:11, the Bereans were praised for testing Paul, not with feelings, not with tradition, but with the Scriptures. **They didn't suspend judgment until some authority told them what to believe**. They listened, then searched the Scriptures daily to see whether those things were so. That's the model, Scripture first, every time. Your objection, "How can someone trust the Scriptures if they have to first prove them?" **is a misdirection**. The Bereans weren't doubting God's Word, **they were testing the messenger**, the same

thing every Christian is commanded to do (1 John 4:1). Paul didn't rebuke them, he called them noble.

As for your dismissal of John 16:13, you're misrepresenting what I said again. I never claimed each believer has "all truth," but the Spirit does lead each believer into truth through the Word. The Holy Spirit doesn't stop working at the pulpit. Romans 8:9 says every believer has the Spirit of Christ, and 1 John 2:27 says the anointing we have teaches us. That's not some fringe doctrine, it's plainly written. And 2 Timothy 3:16–17 says Scripture equips the believer for every good work, not some believer, not a select group, but "the man of God," which includes any believer walking in Christ.

You say you're "correcting my error," but what authority are you claiming, yours or God's? Because I don't recognize your opinions as binding, and I certainly don't need you acting like you're the Holy Spirit. I follow Sola Scriptura, not Sola You. You want to talk about systems "God has ordained," but show me where the Bible says I'm required to submit to man-made indoctrination systems that elevate creeds, frameworks, or your voice above the Word of God. The Bible doesn't say that. It says, "Prove all things, hold fast that which is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21). That command was given to all believers, not just elders, councils, or arrogant men who think they speak for God.

You accuse me of slander, but the truth is, **you exposed yourself**. If calling out false authority and empty traditions that contradict Scripture makes you uncomfortable, that's not slander, that's conviction. You said, "we are meant to be taught from the Word." **I agree**, but **the Word is the standard, not the system doing the teaching**. Scripture never tells me to stop testing just because the teacher thinks he's above correction. You're offended because I won't bow to you or your tone. But Jesus said, "Why do ye also transgress the commandment of God by your tradition?" (Matthew 15:3). **That question still stands**.

And as for your last line, "If you refuse to take correction I leave you to your own devices to suffer the consequences", **save the empty threats**. I'll take correction from the Word of God, not from someone **puffed up with their own opinion**. You don't get to stand in the place of God and call it "correction." The only authority that holds weight here is Scripture, **and you're not it**.

You need to stop acting like you're the final authority on what God's people are allowed to believe, say, or test. You are not the voice of God, and I don't answer to you. I answer to His Word. You may be offended that I keep pointing people back to the Bible instead of bowing to your opinions, but that says more about your pride than about my obedience. Scripture says, "Prove all things, hold fast that which is good" (1 Thessalonians 5:21), and "Let God be true, but every man a liar" (Romans 3:4). That includes you. If you're not willing to have what you say tested by the Word of God, then you're not defending the truth, you're protecting your own ego.

You are trying to shut down the very thing that Scripture commands, that every believer study, examine, and compare what they hear with the truth of God's Word (Acts 17:11). That is not rebellion, it is obedience. You are not above correction, and you're not the gatekeeper of truth. Jesus said His sheep hear His voice, not yours (John 10:27). So if you're threatened by someone calling people back to the Bible, maybe it's because you've gotten used to people depending on your voice instead of God's.

Your authority is nothing without Scripture. If what you teach cannot stand up to the light of God's Word, then it needs to be exposed. Stop trying to control the conversation. This is not about your tradition, your framework, or your personal authority. This is about what God actually said, and I will keep pointing people back to that, whether you like it or not.

And just to let everyone know, you are the one who attacked me and escalated this conversation to this level. I truly hope you're not a leader in your church while behaving like this.
